Presenters will discuss appropriate applications, reliability and validity concerns, data curation, programming (particularly in Python and R), and different computer-aided content analysis tools. Experts will walk through examples of content analysis techniques from published research, address questions, and offer publishing tips.

<u>In Part II</u> (9:30-11:00), experts and authors will interact in small-group roundtables to discuss the content, structure, techniques, and potential journal outlets of each proposal. Research proposals will be selected and shared for pre-reading among group members with similar interests in advance of the PDW.

- 6. Three keywords that describe your proposal
- 7. Identifying information: Name, title, affiliation, e-mail address
- 8. (optional) Code review (experts in 1-2 breakout groups will be able to review Python/R code)
